- scissors and scotch tape

Preparation

Print the fact cards and cut them apart.

Make copies of the Earth Day questions worksheet (2-sided).

Each student will need his or her own copy.

Hide all 18 Earth Day fact cards around your classroom where students will be able to find them.

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Management tips

You may want to make this a silent activity so students don't share answers with each other.

You can have the kids work by themselves or with partners.

Don't be afraid to hide the facts in tough places. Kids think it's more fun when they have to search around a little.

Examples of good hiding spots might include:

- sticking out of a book, like a bookmark
- the back of the classroom door
- lying flat on the classroom bookshelf
- on the side of the bookshelf
- on the back of the teacher's chair

Have a plan for students who finish early. You may want to have an assignment for them to complete when they're done, or you may have them help other students find fact cards.

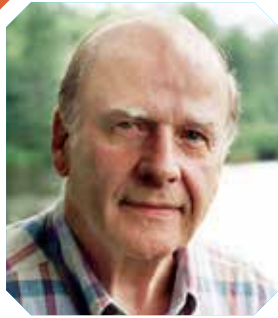

Plastic waste never really goes away. When a plastic bottle is thrown out, instead of recycled, it just breaks down into tiny pieces. Before you throw away a plastic bottle, think about whether it can be recycled.

Cardboard breaks down a lot quicker than plastic. A toilet paper tube can take about two months to decompose. A plastic bottle can take more than 450 years to break down in a landfill.

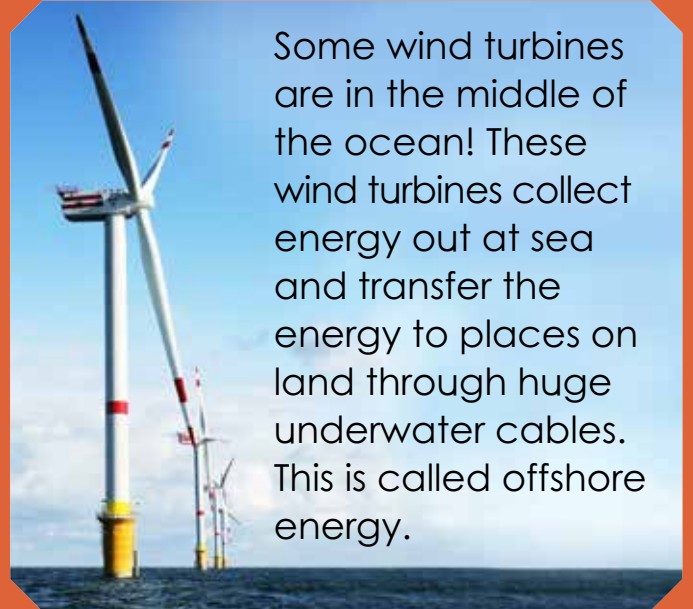
