Native Americans or indigenous people. If something is indigenous, it's original to the land it's in. The Haudenosaunee (HO-den-uh-SHO-nee) are a group of nations native to the Northeast, mostly near the Great Lakes.

Who's in the Group?

Haudenosaunee means People of the Longhouse. You might see them called the Iroquois (EAR-uh-koy) in some books. That's a name Europeans gave them. Or you might see them called the Six Nations. That's because the Haudenosaunee Confederacy is made of six nations. These nations are:

- Mohawk
- Onondaga
- Oneida
- Cayuga
- Seneca
- Tuscarora (joined in 1722)




