Commas with Coordinating Conjunctions

Incorrect punctuation of coordinating conjunctions can be confusing for readers.

If a coordinating conjunction combines two or more independent clauses to create a compound sentence, put a comma in front of it. (Note: independent clauses are complete sentences.)

If a coordinating conjunction only combines single words or phrases, do **not** put a comma in front of it.

examples: Will someone help me, **or** am I on my own? Jack **or** Mya will assist you in a moment.
