Management tips

You may want to make this a silent activity so students don't share answers with each other.

You can have the kids work by themselves or with partners.

Don't be afraid to hide the facts in tough places. Kids think it's more fun when they have to search around a little.

Examples of good hiding spots might include:

- sticking out of a book, like a bookmark
- the back of the classroom door
- lying flat on the classroom bookshelf
- on the side of the bookshelf
- on the back of the teacher's chair

Have a plan for students who finish early. You may want to have an assignment for them to complete when they're done, or you may have them help other students find fact cards.

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The U.S. Constitution has been amended 27 times. The most recent took effect in 1992. It stops Congress from raising their own pay until after a new election.



The 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments ended slavery, gave freed people citizens' rights,

and gave voting rights to all races. They are sometimes called the Civil War or Reconstruction Amendments.


