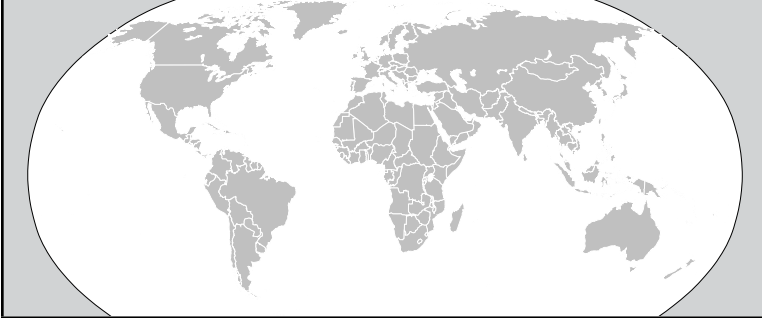

Additional Considerations

If you would like to make this a project about Latin America instead, you may wish to decide as a class which definition you will use. This can be an opportunity to discuss the implications, relative usefulness, and limitations of the term. For example, "Latin America" almost universally includes Brazil, usually includes Haiti, only occasionally includes French Guiana, and almost never includes nations and territories without a predominant Romance language (e.g., Suriname, Belize, the Bahamas, etc.).
