To turn a *plural noun* that *ends in -s* into a **possessive noun** add an **apostrophe (')** after the -s.

example: The farmer painted <u>horses'</u> stables.

To turn a plural noun that does not end in -s into a **possessive noun** add an **apostrophe (')** and an - **s**.

example: The <u>women's</u> hats were beautiful.
