PLEASE JOIN THE AMERICAN RED STARANIMAL PELIF National Headquarters Albany NY The Red Star brought in medical supplies and ambulances for the animals. It also founded the Veterinary Corps (said like "core"). The new Corps enlisted skilled vets, stablehands, and blacksmiths to serve in its ranks. They treated thousands of horses each month.


To gain support and money for their work, the Red Star produced posters. A popular message for these posters was "Help the Horse to Save the Soldier." The Red Star also printed thousands of booklets. Handed out to soldiers, the booklets gave advice on first aid for horses.

An American Humane report praised the war horse for its strength and valor. The write-up equaled it only to the courage and skill of the riders.





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
